CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK FOR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES (NEP 2020)

1. Introduction

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 recognises that higher education plays a crucial role in promoting human and societal well-being, and in developing India as envisioned in its Constitution—a democratic, just, socially conscious, and humane nation that upholds liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all. The NEP 2020 notes, "given the 21st-century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals."

The NEP 2020 states, *"Assessments of educational approaches in undergraduate education that integrate the humanities and arts with Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) have consistently shown positive learning outcomes, including increased creativity and innovation, crucial thinking and higher-order thinking capacities, problem-solving abilities, teamwork, communication skills, more in-depth learning and mastery of curricula across fields, increases in social and moral awareness, etc., besides general engagement and enjoyment of learning."*

Further, the NEP 2020 also recommends that *"the undergraduate degree will be of either 3- or 4-year duration, with multiple exit options within this period, with appropriate certifications."*

In accordance with the NEP 2020, the UGC has formulated a new student-centric **"Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (UGC-CCFUGP 2022)"** incorporating a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, and multiple entry and exit options, which will facilitate students to pursue their career path by choosing the subject/field of their interest.

Based on the UGC-CCFUGP notified in December 2022, Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla (HPU) has developed a Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (HPU-CCFUGP, hereafter HPU-UGP), incorporating all essential aspects of the UGC-CCFUGP to facilitate the achievement of the policy visions stated in the NEP 2020. This HPU-UGP will also apply to the professional courses not covered by other regulatory bodies.

2. New Curriculum and Credit Framework

The aims and objectives of the Curriculum and Credit Framework under NEP 2020 are to highlight certain fundamental principles that will guide both the education system as a whole and individual educational institution. These objectives, as stated below, have a direct bearing on the curricula for different levels of higher education:

- i. First of all, the policy endeavours to recognise, identify, and foster the unique capabilities of each student to promote their holistic development.
- ii. It also attempts to provide flexibility, allowing learners to select their learning trajectories and programmes, and thereby choose their path in life according to their talents and interests.
- iii. The policy promises to provide multidisciplinary and holistic education across the sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities, and sports for an interdisciplinary world.
- iv. It emphasises conceptual understanding rather than rote learning. The policy also aims to foster critical thinking and encourages learners to make logical decisions.
- v. The policy upholds ethics, and human & constitutional values and emphasises building life skills such as communication, teamwork, leadership, and resilience.
- vi. The policy also emphasises the extensive use of technology in teaching and learning, removing language barriers, increasing access for students with disabilities (*Divyang*), and enhancing educational planning and management.
- vii. The policy aims to ensure respect for diversity and the local context in all curricula, pedagogy, and policies.

viii. The policy emphasises equity and inclusion as the cornerstone of all educational decisions, ensuring that all students can thrive in the education system. It also ensures that the institutional environment is responsive to differences, thereby making high-quality education available to all.

ix. The policy also aims to ensure that the education system is grounded in the values of Indian civilisation and fosters pride in India and its rich, diverse, ancient, and modern culture, languages, knowledge systems, and traditions.

3. UG Degree Programmes

The UGC-CCFUGP: 3.2.3 offers various undergraduate degree programmes for students to choose from. The different UG Degree programmes are:

i. UG Degree Programmes with Single Major: A student must secure a minimum of 50% credits in the major discipline for a 3-year/4-year UG Degree to be awarded a single major.

For example:

In a 3-year UG programme, the total number of credits to be earned is 128; a student of History with 64 credits will be awarded a Bachelor of Arts in History with a single major.

Similarly, in a 4-year UG programme, the total number of credits to be earned is 168; a student of History with a minimum of 84 credits will be awarded a Bachelor of Arts (Honours or Honours with Research) in History with a single Major.

ii. UG Degree Programmes with Double Major: A student must secure a minimum of 40% credits in the second major discipline for the 3-year/4-year UG degree to be awarded a double major.

iii. Interdisciplinary Undergraduate Programmes: The credits for core courses shall be distributed among the constituent disciplines/subjects to achieve core competence in the multidisciplinary programme.

For example:

A student opts for (a) Mathematics, (b) Statistics, and (c) Physics for a UG programme. The degree for such students will be a Bachelor of Physical Science, awarded after a 3-year undergraduate programme. For such a candidate, to pursue a degree in the fourth year, they shall have to choose only one of the disciplines (A, B or C) in which they have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years. The degree will be awarded a Bachelor of Physical Sciences (Honours or Honours with Research) in Physics (if chosen Physics) for a 4 -year undergraduate programme.

iv. Multidisciplinary Undergraduate Programmes: For students pursuing a multidisciplinary programme of study, the credits for core courses will be distributed across various broad disciplines, including Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical and Computer Sciences, Data Analysis, Social Sciences, and Humanities.

For example:

A student who opts for a UG programme in Life Sciences will have the total credits to core courses distributed across (a) Botany, (b) Zoology and (c) Human Biology disciplines. The Degree will be awarded as a Bachelor's in Life Sciences for a 3-year UG programme. For such a candidate, to pursue a Degree in the fourth year, he/she shall have to choose only one of the disciplines (either A, B or C) in which he/she has studied at least 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs of Core/Major courses in the first three years. The degree awarded will be Bachelor of Life Science (Honours/ or Honours with Research) in Botany (if chosen Botany) for a 4-year UG Programme.

At the initial stage of implementation of NEP 2020, students shall have the following Degree Options:

A. The 3-year UG Programme shall have two degree options:

i. Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary

ii. Single Core Discipline (Major)

- The students shall declare their Major and Minor, finally, at the end of the second semester.
- In both cases, the requirements of core and common courses remain the same.

B. The Four-year UG Programme shall have two degree options:

i. Honours

ii. Honours with Research

- Students with 3-year Degrees in the Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary programme will have to choose, in the fourth year, only one of the disciplines in which they have studied six DSCs and five DSEs in the first three years.
- Students with a 3-year undergraduate degree in a Single Core Discipline (Major) will pursue a fourth year in their Major discipline.

C. The other UG Programmes, including Double Major, will be initiated in a phased manner in due course of time.

4. List of Core Courses

The core courses comprise Discipline-Specific, Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE), and Minor courses. All core courses have a credit allocation of 4. Altogether, irrespective of any significant or minor options, a student will necessarily need to study 23 courses with a total credit allocation of 92 over a 3-year programme. The degrees relevant to the core courses will be awarded.

i. Major Courses

Courses offered by a particular department for own students. The minimum credit requirement for a Single Core Discipline (Major) over 3 years is 64, which translates to 16 courses, including 5 DSEs.

ii. Minor Courses

One of the Major courses offered by the Department shall be treated as a Minor for students of other departments. The department may also offer a separate course or repeat the same course(s) as a Minor for students of other departments. The minimum credit requirement for a Minor Course over 3 years is 24, which translates to 6 courses.

5. List of Common Courses

As the name suggests, these courses must be studied by all students in the 3-year or 4-year undergraduate programme. Together, the common courses have a credit allocation of 36, divided over five subdivisions.

i. Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC): Total Credits 9

Courses offered by a particular department shall be considered multidisciplinary for students of other departments. A student cannot opt for an MDC catering to their Core Courses (Major and Minor). The student should be motivated to opt for a different subject each semester.

ii. Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): Total Credits 8

Courses on Language and Communication Skills, viz. English, Hindi, and Sanskrit

iii. Skill Enhancement Course(SEC): Total Credits 9

The HEI/College will identify the Skill Enhancement Courses to be offered in a semester, and students will choose the skill course of his/her choice from the courses offered.

iv. I/A/P/C/ (or Work-based Vocational Course*): Total credits 4

Internship/Apprenticeship/Minor Project/Community Outreach (I/A/P/C) or Work-based Vocational Courses are courses common to all students and will be carried out during the winter and summer terms/vacations. Although offered in the second semester, students may be encouraged to make their choice at the end of the first semester, allowing them to carry out activities during winter vacation as well.

*This course will not be offered in the first (beginning) academic session.

v) Value-Addition Course(VAC): Total 6 Credits

These are the course(s) common to all students to be offered as a VAC category in a particular semester. The HEI/College will assign one or more teachers to teach these courses as required, regardless of the teacher's background or qualifications.

6. Eligibility for the UG Programmes

- a. A student who has passed 12th standard or equivalent examination in any stream from a recognised institution (UGC-CCFUGP: 3.2.3).
- b. Admission to the 3-year/4-year UG programme will be based on the preference of the Major, if any. In case a student does not want to opt for any major in the 3-year programmes/they will be admitted based on their preferences for subject combinations.
- c. Admission to a discipline-specific course or major will be subject to the availability of the subject and the capacity of the college/department/centre.
- d. No student shall be eligible for admission to a Programme in any discipline unless s/he fulfils the prerequisites of courses as fixed by the university.

7. Reservation

The statutory reservation policy of the Government of Himachal Pradesh shall be followed in the selection of eligible candidates for admission.

8. Academic Bank of Credits (ABC)

The HPU-UGP is directly connected to the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) as notified by the UGC. All credits a student earns at the end of an examination in HPU-UGP will be deposited in the ABC by the university. As such, a student under HPU-UGP must register for the ABC as notified by the regulatory agencies.

9. Duration for Award of UG Certificate, UG Diploma and Degree

The UG Programmes will be of either 3 or 4-year duration with appropriate certifications and exits, such as:

- i. UG Certificate after completing 1 year (2 semesters) of study in the chosen fields of study with **44 credits**, including four credits in I/A/P/C/ or work-based vocational course(s) offered during winter/or summer term.
- ii. UG Diploma after 2 years (4 semesters) of study with **86 credits**.
- iii. 3-Year Bachelor's Degree after successful completion of three years (6 semesters) with **128 credits**.
- iv. 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours) after successful completion of four years (eight semesters) with **168 credits**.
- v. 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research) after successful completion of four years (eight semesters) with a Research Project or Dissertation under the guidance of an eligible regular faculty member, securing **168 credits**, out of which **12 credits** will be for the Research Project or Dissertation.
- vi. Students will be permitted to take a break from the study during the period of study, but the total duration of completing the programme shall not exceed 7 years.

It should be noted that any certificate/diploma/degree is awarded only if the student clears (i.e., passes) all the required courses (papers) up to that point in time.

Note: College/CDOE/Department/HPU-DES will decide whether to offer a 3-year or 4-year undergraduate programme before the academic session starts. However, the 4-Year Bachelor's Degree Programme may be considered a preferred option, as it would provide an opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education (vide UGC letter No. 27-3/2023 (CU) dated 28th March 2023).

10. Migration

Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme through the regular mode (i.e., a student from any college affiliated with H.P. University) can transfer their admission to CDOE at any point during a semester. Such a student, however, shall have to pay the complete Semester fee of the concerned semester as well, irrespective of the duration of the semester gone by. Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme from CDOE can be migrated or admitted as regular students to colleges against vacant seats at the beginning of the semesters.

11. Inter-Institution Mobility

The HPU-UGP enables students to engage in inter-institutional mobility, both for incoming and outgoing students. For this, HPU will take into account the credits that the student has in their ABC.

For an incoming student, the following should be observed:

- a. The entry is subject to the availability of seats in the concerned discipline.
- b. The student must fulfil all the academic prerequisites of the relevant discipline.
- c. HPU will award a degree to a student only when the student has completed at least 60% of the credits for core courses offered by HPU

12. Option for Online Courses

To achieve the three cardinal principles of India's Education Policy: Access, Equity, and Quality and for the benefit of students, options will be given for students to earn credit by completing quality-assured online programmes offered on the Study Webs of Active Learning for Young Aspiring Minds (SWAYAM: SWAYAM:www.swayam.gov.in) or other online educational platforms approved by HPU as per the existing UGC regulations. Students may opt to earn credits from such courses up to **40 per cent** of the total requirements, including I/A/P/C or work-based Vocational courses. (For details, see HPU SWAYAM Policy)

13. Programme Structure

13.1 Semester

A semester comprises 90 working days, and the academic calendar is divided into two semesters. Winter and Summer terms will be notified separately with a vacation schedule. I/A/P/C/or work-based vocational education, field-based learning, and training will be carried out during the winter and summer terms. Regular courses may also be offered during the winter or summer terms in a fast-track mode, enabling students to complete additional coursework and reduce backlogs. Arrangements may be made for courses to be offered in the winter/or summer terms, depending on the availability of faculty and the number of students.

13.2. Credit Hours

The workload relating to a course is measured in terms of credit hours. A credit is a unit by which the coursework is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum of 15 weeks). Each course may have only a lecture component, a lecture and tutorial component, a lecture and practicum component, a lecture, tutorial, and practicum component or only a practicum component.

13.3.Credit Requirements

The minimum credit requirements of each category of courses for 3-Year and 4-Year Bachelor's Programmes (Honours or Honours with Research) are given in Table 1. **Minimum Credit Requirements to Award Degree under Each Category as per UGC**

14. Entry and Exit Options

As permissible under UGC Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions, students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and after even semesters, provided that they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.

15. Attendance

A student shall be eligible to appear in the end-semester examination only if he/she has a minimum of 75% attendance. The terms and rules governing condoning can be found in the Examination Section of the Ordinance.

16. Examination & Grading

The examination and grading modalities of HPU-UGP will be in accordance with HPU's Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications.

17. Repeating or Options for Other Courses

- i. If a student fails a particular course, they shall be promoted to the next semester and shall repeat the course with the ensuing examinations.
- ii. Repetition of course (s) shall be only for the end-of-semester examinations.
- iii. In place of the failed courses, students may opt for the following in consultation with the parent department:
 - Choose other courses with the same credits offered through CDOE.
 - Choose online/CDOE courses approved by HPU as per existing UGC regulations, having the same credits.

18. Promotion

Students shall be allowed to proceed from one semester to the next in accordance with HPU's Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications.

However, for a student to progress to the 4th year of the undergraduate programme, they must clear all the courses from the previous three years.

Courses and Degree Structure Offered by the College

Under the framework of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 introduced by Himachal Pradesh University, students are provided with multiple pathways to pursue higher education according to their academic interests and career goals. In the Undergraduate Programme for B.A., the University has introduced different degree structures to ensure flexibility, multidisciplinary learning, and skill enhancement.

Government Degree College Nohradhar has been permitted to offer the **Single Core Discipline (Major) with Minor** pattern in the **B.A. programme and Bachelor of Commerce (B. Com-Pass Course) (Three Year Course)** Under this system, students study one subject as their **Major/Core Discipline** in depth, while simultaneously studying another subject as a **Minor Discipline**. This approach enables students to gain specialized knowledge in their chosen major subject along with additional interdisciplinary exposure through the minor subject.

The structure has been designed to strengthen conceptual understanding, analytical ability, communication skills, and employability opportunities among students. It also encourages academic flexibility and holistic development in accordance with the vision of NEP 2020. Through this curriculum, students can build a strong foundation in their primary field of study while broadening their academic perspective with allied disciplines.

The college is committed to effectively implementing this learner-centric curriculum and providing students with quality education, academic guidance, and opportunities for overall personality development.

 - English, or

Important Notes

1. The prescribed credit weightage includes Lecture, Tutorial, and Practical components.
2. In the first semester, students will be offered three different subjects within the same stream: A, B, and C (Core and Minor are provided here for illustrative purposes only).
3. At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes: the Multi-Disciplinary/Interdisciplinary or Single Core Discipline (Major) programme. The student choosing the latter will be required to give his/her Major and Minor at the end of the second semester. Such choices, including DSCs made at the end of the second semester, shall remain in effect until the VI semester.
4. Additional Seats: The Colleges may create 10% extra seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate the request for a change of major. Any unfilled or vacant seats may be filled with those seeking a change of Major. Preference will be given to those with the highest CGPA and no arrears in the first year/semester.
5. The DSCs of another discipline for the first two semesters of students who opt for Major programmes will be treated as Minors.
6. A DSC offered in one discipline will be treated as a Minor by another. Students can choose Minor Courses from two different subjects, but must earn a minimum of 12 credits in each.
7. MDCs must be selected from a broad discipline/pool of MDCs other than Major and Minor subjects.
8. AEC/VAC/SEC-3 should be chosen from a pool of courses. Every discipline shall provide these courses, some of which will be offered discipline-specific, while the rest can be open to students of all other disciplines. However, the two SECs (SEC-1 & SEC-2) must be chosen from the discipline-specific (Core and Minor).
9. A maximum of two language courses can be opted for as Core and Minor. AECs should be in a language other than what is studied in DSCs/Minors.
10. I/A/P/C will be determined at the end of the first semester to enable students to carry out some I/A/P/C activities during winter vacation.
11. To pursue an Honour degree in the 4th year, students will have to choose only one discipline in both semesters, in which s/he have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years.
12. A student who secures 75% or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research, provided HPU has approved the college to offer it.
13. One course per semester (DSC/Minor/MDC/SEC/etc) from a subject offered in two (or more) different programs (e.g. BCA and BSc/ BPA and BA/ BFA and BA/ Shastri and BA/etc) must be the same.
14. Students in the BA programmes can opt for only one DSC each from the Bachelor of Performing Arts (Dance, Music, Vocal & Instrument/Tabla/ etc.) and the Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting/Applied Arts/Sculpture/ etc.).
15. Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfilment of the following conditions: For Major, 64 credits in a 3-year & 84 credits in a 4-year UG programme in a single Major Discipline. For Minor 28 credits in 4-year UG programme in a single Minor Discipline
16. The Dissertation and Project will start in the VII semester. However, the evaluation and assessment will be conducted in both the VII and VIII semesters.

**As this scheme is being introduced for the first time, it is subject to modifications. Any changes applied in subsequent years after admission to the 1st Year will be retrospectively applicable.*

Admission Guidelines for B.A/B.COM 2nd & 3rd Year students



CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

From the academic session 2016-17, H.P. University adopted the UGC framework of curriculum under CBCS to ensure uniformity in the standards of higher education and to provide the students with quality education at par with the best in India. The CBCS provides an opportunity for the students to choose subjects from the prescribed courses comprising of Core, Elective and Skill. In this system, the courses are evaluated following a grading system. The uniform grading system will benefit the students to move across institutions both within and outside India. A candidate shall have to undergo the prescribed courses of study in a period not less than 3 years and not more than 5 years from the date of admission.

Outline of Courses under Choice Based Credit System

As per the recommendations of the committee constituted by the government, it was decided that the Semester system in UG classes be changed to Annual System from the Academic Session 2018-19. The UG programme (3 year degree course) under CBCS in a college affiliated to H.P. University will comprise of the following categories of courses:

- 1. Core Course (CC):** A course, which is compulsorily studied by a candidate as a core requirement
- 2. Discipline Specific Course (DSC):** A course which is chosen from a pool of courses, which may be specific or specialized or supportive to the discipline/subject of study, or which provides an extended scope or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill.

2.1 Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course: Elective Course offered under the main discipline/subject of study are Discipline Specific Elective Course.

- 3. Generic Elective (GE) Course:** An elective course chosen from an unrelated discipline/subject with an intention to seek exposure beyond the discipline/s of choice. The purpose of this course is to offer the students an option to explore disciplines of interest beyond the choices of DSC. GE opted would be other than the two DSCs already offered.

- 4. Ability Enhancement Courses:** AEC are of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)

4.1. Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC): Are courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement. These are mandatory for all disciplines. Courses to be studied under this are - (1) Environmental Science and English Communication/Modern Indian Languages (MIL).

4.2 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): Value-based or skill-based courses, aimed at providing hands-on training designed to enhance competencies and skills of students.

CREDIT DETERMINATION

A student has to earn 132 credits for pass course degree in B.A./B.Com. Programme.

An undergraduate degree in Humanities/Commerce discipline is awarded if a student completes:

- 4 (DSC) Core papers each in two core courses of choice
- 2 Core papers each in English and MIL respectively (compulsory for all)
- 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) (compulsory for all)
- 4 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)
- 2 (DSE) papers each in two selected courses of choice (Discipline Specific Elective)
- 2 papers from the list of Generic Elective (GE) papers.

EVALUATION SYSTEM

➤ **CREDITS**

The term 'credit' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in terms of the number of instructional hours assigned per week. This explains why 'credit' is usually taken to mean 'credit hours'. For the purpose of credit determination, the instructional hours are divided into 3 components:

1. **LECTURES (L):** Class room lectures of one-hour duration.
2. **TUTORIALS (T):** Special, elaborate instructions on specific topics (from lecture) of one hour duration
3. **PRACTICALS (P):** Practical or field exercises of two-hour duration.

Each one of these components is considered equal to one credit. One lecture (L) or one tutorial (T) of one hour a week is considered as one credit, whereas one practical (P) of two hours a week is considered as one credit. The total weightage given to a course in terms of credits will be equal to $L+T+P$, where L is the no. of one hour lectures per week, T is the no. of tutorials per week and P is the no. of 2-hour practicals per week. This can be written in symbols as:

$$C = L+T+P$$

where C is the credit weightage for a particular course

➤ **MARKING / ASSESSMENT SCHEME**

As per H.P. University guidelines, the marking scheme for all undergraduate courses in annual system for B.Com/BA programme (with exception of some practical subjects) will be in the ratio of 70:30

i.e., 70 marks for theory (annual examination) and 30 marks for Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA).

➤ CONTINUOUS COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT (CCA)

The 30 marks under CCA will be determined by the concerned teacher on the basis of the following components:

1. Mid-Term Test=10 marks (BA/B.Com.)
2. Class Test=5 marks .
3. Assignments/Seminars=10 marks
3. Class Room Attendance=5 marks

Class room attendance will be defined as follows:

- > 75% but < 80% =1 mark.
- > 80% but < 85% =2 marks
- > 85% but < 90% =3 marks
- > 90% but < 95% =4 marks
- > 95% =5 marks

➤ MID- TERM TESTS

- Mid-Term Test will be conducted in each course in the academic year which is mandatory for every student to take. Mid-Term Examination on completion of 75% of the syllabus.
- Class tests will be conducted by the teacher on the completion of 40% of the syllabus.

Note:

As per University guidelines, the students who do not get 35% marks in CCA and fail to have minimum 75% class room attendance will not be allowed to appear in annual examination.

GUIDELINES AND CONDITIONS FOR OBTAINING DEGREE

- A candidate has to earn 132 credits for pass course degree in B.A./B.Com. Programme
- Every student shall be required to undergo a regular course of study i.e., attendance in lectures, tutorials, seminars, practical etc., in order to be eligible to appear for University examination. A candidate should attain minimum 75% attendance in each of the concerned courses in Theory and Practical, separately.
- Internal Assessment/Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and Annual Examination will be as per HPU guidelines.
- In Annual System under CBCS, 40% marks in aggregate (Internal Assessment + Final Exams) is the minimum qualifying marks. However, it is compulsory to score minimum 35% marks in CCA and Final Examination separately. For practicals, minimum 40% passing marks are mandatory.
- A student failing either in one or two papers in annual examination will be placed under compartment in those papers. Such student/s will have only two chances, one at supplementary stage and another at the annual stage, to clear the compartment.
- A student failing in three or more papers will be treated as failed and will have to repeat the class.
- The results will be declared as per grading system and the students will have to complete the degree within 5 years.

Note: The above guidelines may vary as per the latest notification issued by H.P. University

ELEGIBILITY AND CONDITIONS

- 1. B.A. Pass Course:** Provided that the student who has passed +2 examination or an examination equivalent thereto, accepted as equivalent by various bodies of H.P. University with 33% marks (including English). The students opting for Mathematics as one of the subjects of study must have 45% marks in aggregate or 45% marks in Mathematics at +2 level. However, a student who has passed qualifying examination in Arts stream will be given preference in B.A. programme.
- 2. B.Com. Pass Course:** The minimum eligibility condition for a student to get admission in B.Com. is 33% marks at +2 level. However, a student who has passed qualifying examination in Commerce stream will be given preference in the Commerce programme. The candidates opting for Commerce from other streams must have passed Mathematics/Economics as compulsory subjects at +2 level with a minimum of 45% marks in respective subject/s and 40% in aggregate.
- 3.** A student who has passed Shastri, Prak Shastri from a Sanskrit College affiliated to H.P. University or Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan (Deemed University) under MHRD, Govt. of India, shall be eligible for admission to Arts stream only, provided the candidate has passed Prak Shastri or Shastri with English as one of the subjects.
- 4.** Vocational subjects under National Vocational Education Qualification Framework (NVEQF) shall be given weightage equivalent to any other general education subject.
- 5.** All the admissions in B.A./B.Com. programme will be made on the merit of +2 examination, taking into consideration the best five subjects including English as one of the subjects.

6. **The students placed under compartment or failed in +2 examination are not eligible for admission to the college.**
7. Admission against quota meant for outstanding students in sports and cultural activities shall be made only once in the beginning of the session. These students must also qualify the minimum eligibility conditions for admission in that course as provided under rules.
8. Only those students will be considered for Sports quota who have participated in international/ National/ State/District Level Tournaments (or secured positions).
9. Only those students who have participated in cultural events at National /state/district Level will be considered for the quota meant for outstanding students in cultural activities.
10. It will be mandatory for the students admitted against Sports and Cultural quotas to participate in sports/cultural events.

Upper Age Limit

1. An applicant must not be more than 23 years of age (25 years in case of girl students) as on July 1, 2026. A relaxation of 3 years is applicable to candidates belonging to SC/ST category.
2. The Vice-Chancellor, H.P.U. may, in exceptional cases/circumstances, to be recorded in writing, give relaxation in age up to a maximum of 6 months to any candidate. All such cases of age relaxation of up to six months may be granted admission provisionally by the Principal and a consolidated list of all such cases will be sent for approval to the Vice-Chancellor by 31st October of every academic year.
3. Relaxation in upper age limit is admissible to physically challenged candidates also.

Note: *All admissions made by the college are provisional till regularized by H.P. University. University ordinance shall be strictly adhered to in admission to all classes.*

RESERVATION OF SEATS FOR ADMISSION (ORDINANCE 3.14)

The college follows the reservation policy of H. P. Government adopted by H. P. University in admissions. The following reservations are adopted in accordance with the reservation roster devised by H. P. University:

Scheduled Caste (SC)	15%
Scheduled Tribe (ST)	7.5%
Sports (SP)	5%
Cultural Activities (CUL)	5%
Persons with Disability (PwD)	5%
Economically Weaker Section (EWS)	10%

These reservations will be applicable to those who have passed their qualifying examination from H. P. Board of School Education or from any other schools located within the territorial jurisdiction of Himachal Pradesh or bonafide resident of Himachal Pradesh. Seats under Sports and Cultural quotas will be allotted to those students

who have participated in events recognized by H. P. U. Sports and Co- Curricular Council. The final decision to allot seats in these quotas will be with the respective committees constituted for the same. For reservation, the following roster will be followed:

ADMISSION PROCEDURE AND CRITERIA

(B.A./ B.Com. Pass Course)

Guidelines and General Instructions:

- The candidates seeking admission to the above courses should apply **online**. Also, all the documents must be produced in original at the time of counseling. The form, complete in all respect, is to be filled by the candidate and copies of the requisite documents should be uploaded through the college website www.gdcnohradhar.ac.in.
- Subject wise merit list will be displayed on the college notice board and the college website on the dates notified by the University.
- The admission form recommended by the Admission Committee and approved by the Principal entitles a student to deposit the prescribed fee within the stipulated period.
- A candidate who fails to deposit the fees/dues by the scheduled date and time shall forfeit her right to admission and the seat shall be offered to the next student in the merit list for which the notices will be displayed on the official website, accordingly.
- In case of a tie, the candidate older in age shall be given weightage.
- Roster for reservation of seats in various categories shall be as per the ordinance of HP University, Shimla.
- Incomplete admission forms and those without hard copies (at the time of counselling) of uploaded documents will **not** be entertained.
- No admission, whatsoever, shall be made after the due date.
- All admissions will be as per admission schedule notified by H.P. University from time to time.

Documents and Certificates to be Uploaded

- Passport size photograph
- Copy of **Matriculation** certificate
- Copy of **10+2** certificate
- Copy of **Original Character Certificate** from the Head of the Institution last attended or character certificate issued by a Gazetted Officer in case of a private candidate. The character certificate should **not have been issued more than 6 months prior to** the date of admission.
- Copy of certificate issued by competent authority for availing benefit of **reservation** in the category concerned.
- Copy of **Bonafide Himachali Certificate** for the exemption of Tuition Fee.
- A documentary evidence/declaration as the proof of activities for the **period of gap** in the academic career (Maximum gap of 2 years is permissible).
- An **equivalence eligibility certificate** from HP Board/University for the candidates who have passed +2 from a Board other than HP Board of School Education/ ICSE/ CBSE
- Copy of **original Migration certificate** for the candidates who have passed from Board /University other than the HP Board of School Education /HP University.
- Copy of **Aadhar** card

Note:

- *Admission without any of the above-mentioned documents shall be purely provisional and at the candidate's own risk.*
- *The candidate must produce all her/his original certificates for verification when demanded by the Admission Committee/college office as and when notified.*
- *Student must furnish the college with their latest Aadhar, Email ID, and Mobile No.*

ADMISSION AND COURSE GUIDELINES FOR B.A./ B.Com. II & III YEAR

- Admission to the above classes shall be on **Roll-on** basis as per the date/s notified by the University. Under Roll-on system, the student who has taken the examination of I and II year in the previous session is allowed to take **provisional admission** in the next class i.e. in II and III year respectively, without waiting for the final result.
- **Roll-on provisional admission** to the next class will be regularized only if the student is declared passed (or placed under compartment).
- However, these students will have to fulfill all the formalities of admission laid down by the college authorities within the stipulated date and time.
- **DSC-1 and DSC-2 subjects, once chosen/allotted in B.A. I year cannot be changed in II or III year.**
- The students getting admission in II year will have to study two Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC- 1 & SEC-2) of DSC-1 in addition to DSC-1, DSC-2, Compulsory English/MIL in B.A, B.Com. students.
- The students seeking admission in B.A./B.Com. III year will study the Discipline Specific Elective (DSE-1, DSE-2) courses in the subjects/disciplines studied earlier, SEC-3 and SEC-4 in the subject of their first choice and two courses of Generic Elective (GE-1 & GE-2) of an unrelated subject/discipline, other than DSE-1 and DSE-2.

Note: All the candidates are directed to strictly adhere to the timeline prescribed by the H. P. University

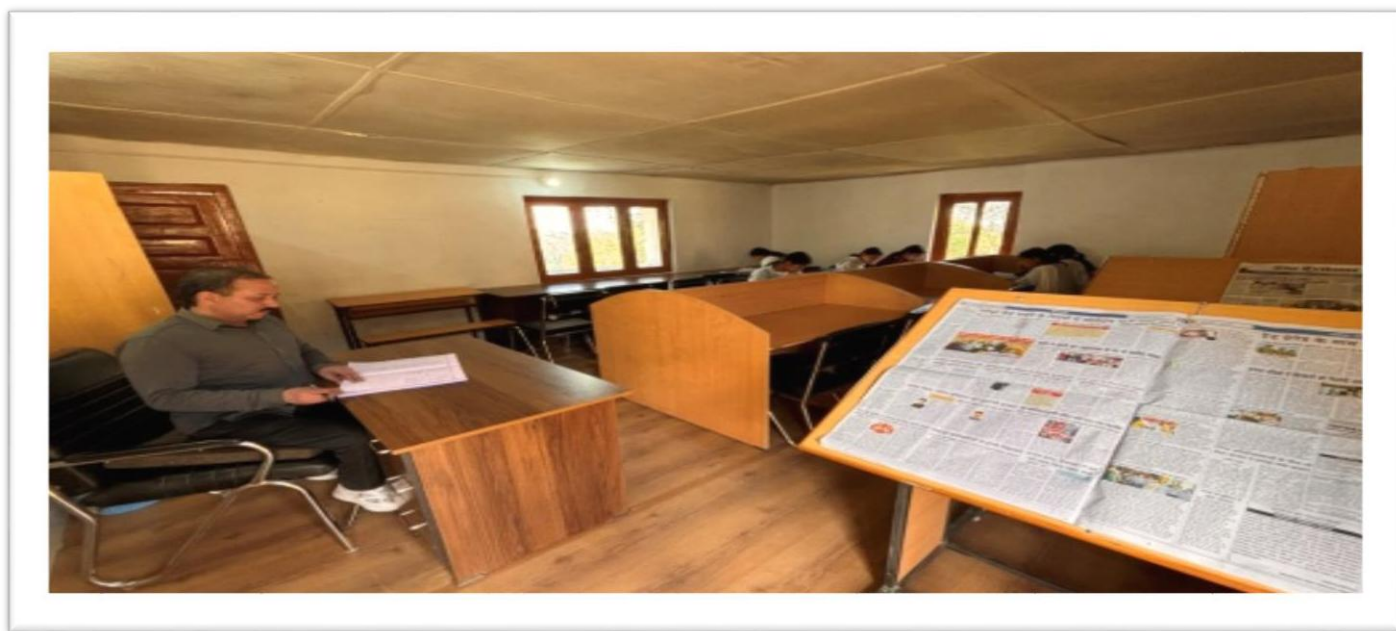
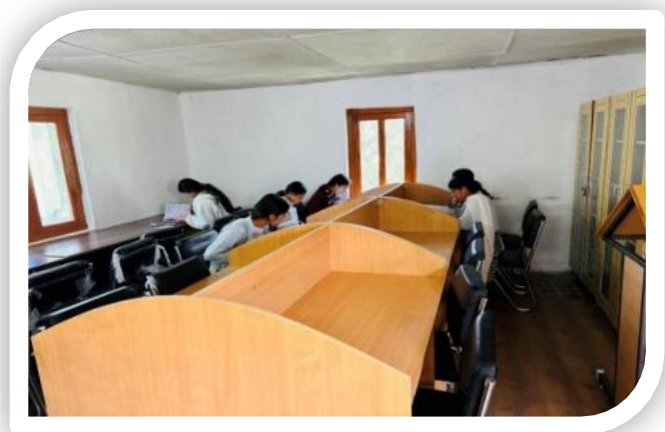

Fines and Penalties

1. In case a student does not deposit his/ her dues on the dates notified, his/her name will be struck off from the College rolls at the end of the month.
2. The name of a student will also be struck off from the college rolls if he/she remains absent, without sanctioned leave, continuously for 10 lectures or more.
3. The student must be accompanied by his/ her parent or guardian at the time of re-admission.
4. Once the name is struck off, the student must seek re-admission within seven days.
5. Every student will have to procure no-dues certificate from College/Library/Concerned Science Department/ NSS /Sports/ College Canteen/Fee Clerk etc. if he/she wants to leave the College.

The library security deposited at the time of admission will lapse if a student does not apply for refund within one year of leaving the college.

Library: A learning Space



A well equipped library, with internet facility, caters to the need of the students through its two-fold service i.e., the Reading Room & the issuance of books. It has a fairly good collection of books and has different sections for text books and reference books. The library subscribes to as many as 03 newspapers (Hindi/English), and 03 magazines regularly. Students are encouraged to avail library facility during working hours on all working days. The college has a rich collection of reference and text books for the benefit of students.

Library Rules

Library-cum-Identity Card will be issued by the Librarian at the time of admission and every student is required to register himself/herself as a member of the library.

Books are issued on the Library-Cum-Identity Card and they must produce the card every time they visit the library.

Only 2 books are issued at a time for 7 days. The Librarian has the right to recall the books at any time. Reference books are not issued to students.

- i. In case of loss of a book, the student will have to replace the book or pay fine in addition to the printed price of the book with the permission of the Principal.
- ii. The student is responsible for the book as soon as it is issued. In case a book is defaced or damaged in anyway, the book is to be replaced by him/ her.
- iii. Students can get books issued from the book bank by paying 20% of the cost of the book in addition to the actual cost of the book.
- iv. Schedule/Time for issuance of books will be conveyed through notice.

IDENTITY CARD

- A student without an identity card, duly signed by the Principal, is deemed as an outsider.
- No student is allowed to enter the college premises without the identity card.
- A student is not permitted to replace his/ her photograph on the identity card.
- In case the identity card is lost, a duplicate card will be issued only after an FIR is registered with the nearest police station and an original copy of this FIR appended with such request.

LEAVE RULE FOR STUDENTS

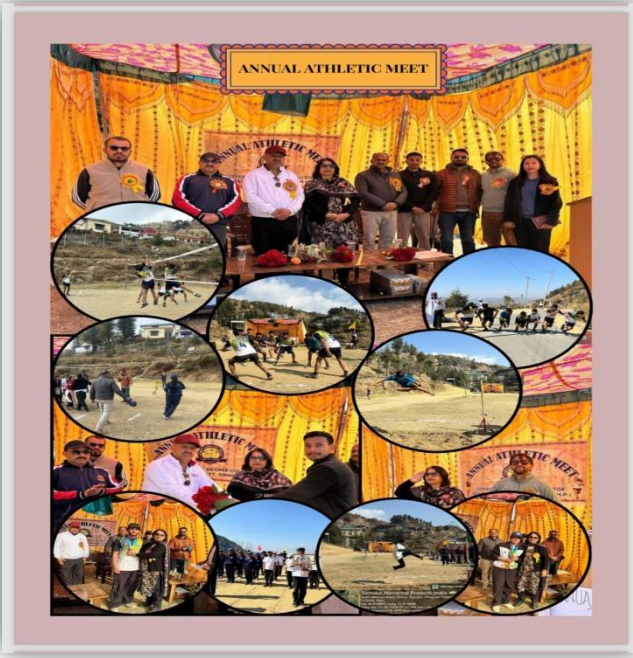
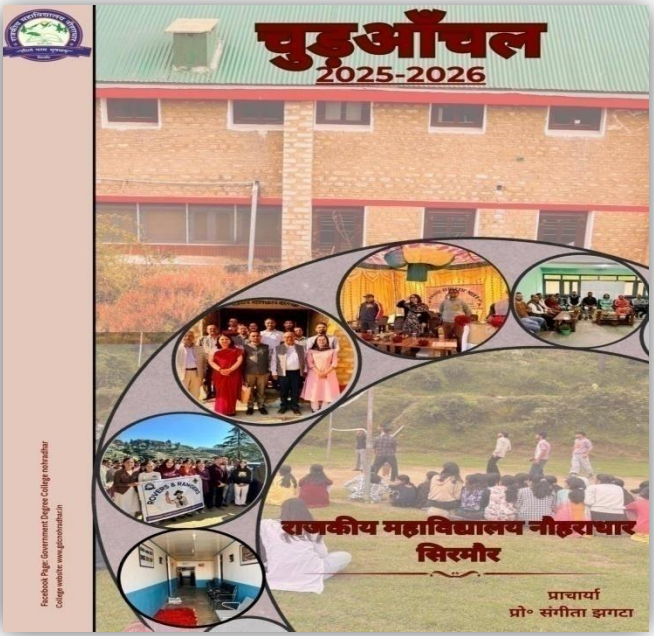
- A student can proceed on leave with the prior permission of the Principal obtained on the application form (available in the college office), but it must be signed by her parent or guardian.
- Once leave is sanctioned a student is required to inform the teacher concerned.
- The subject teacher can sanction leave up to 10 days while leave for more than 10 days will be sanctioned by the Principal.
- Leave on account of illness of more than 10 days must be accompanied by a Medical Certificate/ Registration slip.
- A student may proceed on any kind of leave but he/ she must deposit his/her fees/fines on the appointed day and date, otherwise his/her admission will stand canceled. Similarly, he/she is also required to return the books borrowed from the library on the due date.

- Students, who represent the college in various inter-college games or other competitions will have to get their leave sanctioned from the Principal and noted by the subject teachers concerned before their departure for the event.
- No leave will be granted during Mid Term examinations.

SPORTS



The college offers sports facilities for girls and boys in the college campus ground to engage themselves in various sports activities to participate in Inter-College and Inter-University sports championships in Volley Ball, Badminton, Cricket, Kho Kho, Athletics, Cross Country, Chess. The college organizes **Annual Athletic Meet** to cater opportunities for students to showcase their talents in various sports activities.



The college brings out yearly issue of its magazine “**CHUDAANCHAL**” with unfailing regularity. Students, having keen interest in writing, submit their articles within the specified dates for publication in the various sections of the magazine. The magazine offers an opportunity to the students to develop their writing skills in various languages.

MEMORANDUMS OF UNDERSTANDING

Educational Institutions have a responsibility to go beyond academics and shape well-rounded individuals. To achieve this Government Degree College Nohradhar has established meaningful partnerships through Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) with various Institutions and Government bodies to boost the academic and professional skills of students. The college has collaborated with the following Institutions:

CLUB & SOCIETIES

National Service Scheme (NSS)

Government Degree College Nohradhar is going to introduce National Service Scheme from this very session, where volunteers of the college will be working towards social welfare activities, social awareness and national integration, make sincere efforts to motivate people to overcome selfishness and be the comrades of the NSS motto, "Not me, but you."

The Bharat Scouts and Guides

Activities undertaken by the Bharat Scouts and Guides are primarily based on community development. The college has proposed one unit of this organization with about 40 student/rangers. Voluntary membership can be obtained by depositing a fee of Rs.10/only.

CAREER COUNSELLING, TRAINING AND PLACEMENT CELL

Career counseling, training and placement Cell, with the help of subject societies, guides the students regarding different career prospects open to them. Clippings of advertisements for different posts/training programmes, from various newspapers and universities are also displayed on the notice board for the benefit of students. Resource persons from government and private agencies are also invited by the cell to counsel the students. From this session the Cell is conducting **coaching programme** in hybrid mode for Final year students of every stream to help them qualify competitive entrance exams. The same will be facilitated with question banks and mock tests at regular interval.

WOMEN CELL

This cell has been constituted to achieve the objective of gender equality by making girls and boys aware of their rights and duties. Gender disparity manifests itself in various forms and the underlying causes for the discrimination are related to social and economic structure, which is based on informal and formal norms and practices. The cell frequently organizes interactive sessions with students to get an insight into gender -specific problems which need to be addressed on priority basis.

SC/ST/OBC CELL

This cell does the onerous job of sensitizing young students towards the concerns of the marginalized and the under privileged. The teachers put in special efforts to help students tide over their weaknesses so that they can easily attain academic excellence required for pursuing higher education.

DISASTER MANAGEMENT CELL

The cell, with the help of police personnel and home guards, makes sincere efforts to train and produce a team of young, alert, informed enthusiasts who will be able to work at a phenomenal speed, without losing equanimity of mind, in the event of any natural or a man-made disaster.

RED RIBBON CLUB

The Red Ribbon Club works actively in the college. Students can get registered as volunteers of this club which exclusively aims at launching an exhaustive campaign against AIDS. The Club is not only educating and sensitizing the youth but also taking a lead in reaching out to the public.

ROAD SAFETY CLUB
